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
Pocras Park Rededication

A hot and sunny Sunday afternoon on June 30th did not deter a large crowd from participating in the Pocras Park rededication. Neighbors, children, members of the Pocras Family, and Lincoln Parks and Recreation enjoyed the festivities of the afternoon. The kids absolutely loved the clown, balloons and investigating the interiors of the police car and fire truck. Everyone cooled off with the free ice cream from Goodrich Dairy and bottled water from Leon's along with Colby Ridge popcorn. The biggest hit of the afternoon, however, was the new playground. It's quite pleasurable to drive by and see the families and children enjoying this new addition to the neighborhood.

This neighborhood park, also known as the "Triangle Park", is located at Bradfield Drive/ Sewell/Jefferson and Ryons streets and was in desperate need of renovation. A very big "thank you" to Cynthia Woods and Nelle Jamison for their long hours in working with Parks and Recreation in developing and designing this park. They deserve full credit for a fabulous park party on June 30thas well.

There's still more to be done at Pocras Park. A special grant will allow new trees and other landscaping to be installed this fall. A drinking fountain has been installed by the gazebo and new grass has just been planted. We also hope to keep an area marked for those who like to play pick-up baseball and soccer. The wish-list, however, is endless!

Yes, there are other items that are needed, but we still need to raise more money. At this time there is no electricity to the park for lighting or other needs. The cost to bring electricity to the park will be \$8,000 and CCNA pledged \$4,000 towards this project. 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

School Days, School Days, Good old golden rule days...

The song may be old, but the lyrics still have meaning. The 2007-2008 school year has begun – new backpacks, new shoes and outfits and hopefully lots of learning and good memories. The Country Club Neighborhood Association contains Sheridan Elementary School and Irving Middle School inside our boundaries,

but we also have CCNA students who attend schools in their district, but outside our boundaries: Elementaries – Beattie, Prescott, Cathedral of the Risen Christ (K-8) and Rousseau; Pound Middle School; Southeast High School and Lincoln High School. Our schools and our students contribute to the pride and

Sheridan Elementary

Most of you have probably already noticed the blocks of fencing around the school, the huge pieces of machinery and stacks of construction material. You have probably also noticed lots of yellow school buses up and down the streets of the neighborhood. This is because renovation has begun at Sheridan and will continue during the 2007-2008 school year. During this time period, staff and students are attending "Sheridan" at 8400 Cody Drive which is south of Pine Lake Road and east of South 14th Street.

According to Mrs. Mary Kanter, principal, the focus during this school year will be to continue helping all students reach their full potential. School improvement goals emphasize strategies to help students improve in the areas of literacy and math. As these goals are accomplished, students will become stronger readers, thinkers, speakers, learners and citizens.

Sheridan will also continue with a strong emphasis on the arts during this school year. The year will begin with a visit from Dennis Warner in September.

Mr. Warner, a Minnesota resident, has written many songs, released many CD's, appeared on numerous radio and T.V. shows and received his most notable honor for song writing with an invitation to perform in concert at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. He does special concerts, "Just for kids and others who like to have fun!" His book,

Beads on One String, evolved from his love for children and his hope for the future. Classroom teachers and the art and music teachers will team with him to help children recognize their strengths and talents through art and music. The entire student body will go to the LIED in December for a performance. Other musicians, authors and artists will visit and work with students throughout the entire school year.

Sheridan will begin the year with about 420 students. Since they are being bussed to the south site, everyone is asked to help in keeping students safe as they wait for busses.

Sheridan Renovation

Renovation has begun at Sheridan Elementary and will continue during the 2007-2008 school year. Air conditioning, new lighting and heating and a sprinkler system will be added to the building. Three new kindergarten rooms will be added on the first level and the media and computer lab will be moved to the lower level. Staff, parents and students are excited about the changes being made to improve the facility.

Beattie and Prescott Elementary

In returning to school this year, students found many exciting changes. While being off-site for the 2006-2007 school year, remodeling and rehabilitation were being completed at these schools. We are anxious to hear how the students are enjoying their new surroundings.

Rousseau Elementary

The Maude Rousseau Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA) is gearing up for another exciting year. The PTSA is continuing to focus on what it can do to help the teachers, students, parents and administrators get the most of the educational experience. The PTSA has well over 200 members and looks to continue to grow as the school enrollment continues to grow.

The PTSA provides both financial support and volunteer assistance throughout the school year. The parents of Rousseau students volunteer their time to help out in the classroom and with extracurricular activities. A few of these activities include providing room parents to assist teachers, organizing and leading programs, sponsoring field trips, developing after school programs, providing college scholarships for Rousseau alums and putting on an annual "Fun Night" for the school.

In order to support the PTSA, several fund raisers are held throughout the year. Through revenues raised in the past with the sales of the gift, paper and food sales campaign held every fall, there are many other fund raising activities – POGO card sales, Box Tops for Education, Fun Night Sponsorships and more. If you would like to learn more about the PTSA and what you can do to help support the "Rousseau Family", please stop by the school or come to one of the monthly meetings which are generally held the 3rd Monday of every month.

Southeast High School -- Go Knights!

"Tradition', while expanding on the new and improved", will be the operative theme for the 2007-2008 school year. Tradition, in that Southeast will continue its admirable history in academic excellence, the arts and sciences, sports and extracurricular activities and preparing our students to be the best that they can be. Southeast is proud of its stellar reputation and plans to continue working for the respect it has achieved over the years. The administration, staff and students are committed to making this another outstanding school year.

While not relying on just "tradition", Southeast is also expanding in the "new and improved" department. While renovations were put on hold for a couple of years, 2006 finally saw the beginnings of the much needed construction:

Irving Middle School

Irving Middle School is opening its doors for the 81st school year. In keeping with Irving's strong academic tradition, approximately 830 students and staff will be working in Professional Learning Communities this school year. This will help staff to identify essential learning outcomes of the curriculum as well as how to better assess how students are learning the material. There are nine designated dates on the school calendar this year for staff to work in their PLC groups. On the last Tuesday of each

- The south addition to the building opened to students the beginning of this school year. It includes a new foods lab and clothing labs for Family and Consumer Sciences along with 8 new general purpose classrooms.
- Many classrooms and hallways have been remodeled with new windows, ceilings, lighting, flooring and paint.
- Hallway bathrooms have been updated and remodeled.

- An expanded weight room has opened.
- Gyms have been cooled.
- To the east, steel is in place for

- a new entrance and commons area for students.
- Work on the auditorium begins in April, 2008, and should be completed by that November.
- Exterior landscaping is being planned at the completion of the construction project.

While the construction may be somewhat disruptive at times, our students have been able to make this a positive learning experience. They see hard work first hand. They have learned to be flexible and adaptable. They learn "gratitude" to the taxpayers for making this possible. This, along with academics and the entire school experience, is also giving our students life-experiences.

month at 1:38 PM students will be dismissed so teachers can work in their PLC groups. The desired outcome is to see an increase in student learning.

Irving also recognizes that learning and a successful educational environment go hand-in-hand with the overall positive attitude and behavior of students. A "school's climate" carries over into the learning experience in middle school, high school and into the adult years. This positive attitude and behavior also makes our students better citizens and neighbors in their community. During the 2007-2008 school year Irving Middle year at Irving Middle School! School administration, staff and students will be emphasizing a school-wide positive behavior support program.

In the Ventures in Partnership (VIP) program, Irving has partnered with Lincoln Parks and Recreation Department and the Irving Recreational Center. The Rec Center is always a hit with the students and provides a

variety of after-school clubs, sports and craft activities. Students can join the Rec Center after school program for \$1.00 per day. Some of the activities include craft club, hiphop dance team, a homework room, Othello Masters, preseason intramural sports clinics for the 7th and 8th grades, 6th grade sports camps, strength and conditioning club, Studio 2B, Sudoko Club, tennis club, a theatre project and "verb". Students are encouraged to get involved in after-school events whether they are sponsored by the school or the Rec Center.

September – October – November Meetings Addressing Lincoln's Budget Woes

Our Parks and boulevards set our neighborhood apart from the rest of the city. New developments try to imitate us. Because of the severe budget cuts over the last several years our green spaces, streets and curbs are looking very worn and tired.

We have set aside the following meetings to visit with you – and brain storm - specifically about these matters. Please mark your calendars and plan to attend these very important meetings:

- September 18th, Tuesday all neighbors who live on or adjacent to Sheridan Boulevard
- October 16th, Tuesday all neighbors who live on or adjacent to Bradfield Drive, Stratford Avenue and Manse
- November 20th, Tuesday all neighbors who live on or adjacent to Woodsdale Boulevard.

Don't Get Caught With Your Lines Down...

Those are your power lines. It will be ten years ago this October that we experienced that early winter storm that knocked out power for up to 10 days in some parts of Lincoln. Even after some of the major power lines were repaired people did not have electricity – their "drops" were still down. "Drops" are the lines that run from the pole to your house.

Autumn and early spring are the best times to get your lines buried. Your gardens have finished flowering or they have not yet begun to bloom. Any lawn repair is also best during these times. So, how do you get your lines buried and how much will it cost?

- Call Roger Wohlers at Lincoln Electric System. Call him at 475-4211 or 467-7570 or 430-9513. Roger will come to your home and visit with you about the project.
- Cost Option #1 FREE! LES does not charge for the trenching from the pole to the house. They will bury the electric, telephone and cable all at once. All you have to do is pay to have your electrician get your electric meter ready to receive the lines from overhead to underground.
- Cost Option #2 Ask Roger. If you don't want your yard trenched and would rather have it bored, LES will have a charge for the boring.

You will receive many benefits from having your lines buried. The most obvious is that you greatly reduce your chances of losing power by having limbs fall on the lines, squirrels filing their teeth on your lines or just a good old storm wreaking its havoc.

The most "not obvious" is that the lines aren't obvious. It's so nice looking outside your house and not seeing all those wires. Give Roger a call today.

Pedestrian Crossing Signals

Navigating an intersection, especially if you are a pedestrian, just got easier. Instead of the flashing Walk or Don't Walk traffic signal icon, pedestrians now have a "count down" signal to let them know how much time they have to cross the street. This should increase safety for both the driver and the pedestrian.

All 4 corners of the intersection at 27th and Van Dorn now have the "count down" signals. At a total cost of \$2,400 for these crossing signals, this safety improvement was paid for by the Country Club Neighborhood Association, Irving Parent/ Teacher/Student Organization and Sheridan Elementary Parent Teacher Organization.

Winterizing Your **HOME**

The sizzling heat of July and August had a lot of people wishing for winter. No, not the snow and the ice, but just something cold. Remember, be afraid of what you wish for...

Summer did take its toll on yards and homes. Autumn is the time to do "damage control" and prepare for winter. The following are simple tips to keep you warm during winter and then welcome a beautiful spring:

Your Yard

Did you know that a well-groomed and landscaped yard can add 10% to 15% to the value of your home? Likewise, a bad yard (even that of your neighbors) takes away from curb appeal and value.

- Mid October is a good time to apply a winter weed/ feed. This is the best time to kill broadleaf weeds (dandelions, spurge, etc.) and stimulate deep root growth. This application also helps to prevent snow mold.
- Rake up those leaves! While they make good mulch around bushes and plants, they will smother and kill your grass.
- Trim branches and bushes away from the house.
 Winter winds and ice can cause breakage and damage to your house.
- Still time to put water on the lawn of at least 1" a week. This not only helps the grass, but also prevents the soil from compacting, shrinking and cracking. This lack of moisture can cause your driveway and walks to heave or settle. Then the snow melts into these cracks, expands when it freezes and can cause foundation, etc. problems.

Your House

Most of us do not take the time, let alone think, about "inspecting" our homes. When is the last time you had your fireplace cleaned? Your roof inspected? It is better to spend a little money getting small things taken care of than buckets of money later because of delayed maintenance. You can do a thorough inspection yourself or hire companies that will do it for a fee. These are some of the main things to do before winter:

 Have your furnace cleaned and serviced. Change your filters monthly. Make sure there are no carbon monoxide leaks. This could save your life and make your unit more efficient.



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- Have your fireplace cleaned and checked. It's
 wonderful walking through the neighborhood in the
 evening and taking in the aroma of a wood burning
 fireplace. Just make sure it's safe.
- Check out your roof. Don't have a ladder tall enough to get up and look? Go to your neighbors and ask if you can look out a second floor window. You would be surprised how many people have hail damage and don't know it. Call your insurance agent to come and look for hail damage. The best you can get is a new roof!
- Close any air gaps around windows and doors. Caulk and weather stripping are very inexpensive but can save a lot of money.
- Make sure your gutters are clean, extensions on the downspouts and dirt around the foundation with a positive slope away from the house.

Your Closets

Make sure they are filled with plenty of warm coats, mittens, hats and boots. You will need them while enjoying those brisk walks through the neighborhood.

Everything's Great -- But for One, Smelly Item...

Dog Waste! Lots of children and adults are enjoying the new park. People have used the gazebo for birthday parties, picnics and lunches and just sitting on the benches. New garbage cans have been strategically placed for people's use. The only problem is that pet owners are also using these new trash cans – for depositing dog waste! It is smelly and distasteful. The Parks & Rec's budget only allows for a monthly – if at all – pick up of the trash.

The Pooper/Scooper law addresses the issue of depositing dog waste in public containers. If a container is marked "No Dog Waste", no dog waste! While you would think that people would not deposit dog waste in containers at a playground where children play and people are having a picnic, some unthinking people still do. Something had to be done.

CCNA purchased 2 new trash cans with lids and had them labeled "No Dog Waste". We have also hired a refuse service to pick up trash at Pocras Park twice a week and reline the trash cans each time. While this is not an ideal use of funds, it was decided that the health, safety and enjoyment of the park was more important.

So please, continue picking up after your dog, but do not deposit it in the trash cans at Pocras Park or any other place. Take it home with you. Thank you!


