
Here is a partial calendar of events for our neighborhood:





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Meet the Neighbor: Country Club of Lincoln, 3200 South 24th Street

In previous issues we've introduced several notable neighbors. This time we wanted to highlight the namesake of our neighborhood- the Country Club of Lincoln (CCL). We talked with our neighbor Dave Hansen who is current president of the CCL Board.



Dave, can give me a little history of the Country Club?

It was founded in 1903 as a 9-hole golf course located at 7th & Washington Street. In 1922 it moved to the present location and it really was out in the country, there were no houses built yet.

What is the CCL?

18 holes of golf with practice range, tennis courts and fitness center. We have formal and informal dining and a full ballroom with

Is the Club for youth or adults?

Both. In June we open the newly renovated (at a cost of \$1.7 million) swim pool complex and outside dining area. We offer swim teams and sports lessons for youth. We focus on family sports and activities.

Who pays for the upkeep of the grounds and facilities?

No tax dollars are used; it is privately supported by approximately 500 members.

How are members selected, any restrictions?

There are no restrictions on race, religion, age or gender. Current members nominate new members, but we can arrange an introduction if you are interested.

What type and cost of memberships?

Regular —access to everything with free golf – initiation fee \$5,000 to \$10,000. Plus monthly dues.

Social —access to everything except golf.—initiation fee \$1,500. Plus monthly dues.

Contact Deb Jacob at 423-8502 and she will provide information and arrange a tour or a round of golf or lunch or dinner.

Can non-members use the CCL?

The club is available for use by the public. However, you must have a member sponsor you or your event. A guest fee is charged for use of banquet room, golf, or facilities.


How does the Club benefit the neighborhood?

First of all, we're proud to be a real estate anchor in the neighborhood and we strive to keep our grounds in beautiful top condition to enhance all surrounding property values. We put on a huge 4th of July fireworks show at dusk every year that people can enjoy from their own front yard. And for years we have employed the youth of the neighborhood—in the dining rooms, for banquets and weddings, at the pool and tennis courts and on the grounds. We're also a dues paying member of the CCNA!

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Save South Branch Library!

The Lincoln Library Board voted to close the South Branch and Bethany Libraries in response to possible budget cuts by the city government. This is a poor solution.

South Branch Library is one of the few libraries left in Lincoln that serves older neighborhoods.

- South Branch serves lower income families
- South Branch is one of the most ECONOMICALLY viable libraries.

It is in times like this that a low cost operation should be favored, not censored.

The CCNA asked Mayor Beutler his intentions regarding the South Branch Library and the Irving Swim Pool. Nothing guaranteed. Your action still needed! Read his response.

Dear Country Club Neighborhood Residents,

Thank you for your support of the South Branch Library. I appreciate your passion for your library and its importance to your neighborhood.

The national recession is causing a decline in our City sales tax base and property tax base. We are concerned that the City will have to operate with considerably less revenue than last year while coping with increased service costs. The Library Board prioritized its offerings in response and recommended the closure of two libraries, including the South Branch, if they are forced to operate with severely reduced revenues.

We are just beginning budget discussions in the Mayor's Office and examining our revenue projections. I will offer my budget to the community in June. The City Council will hold public hearings and deliberate over the summer. The budget will be finalized in mid-August.

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community. Lincoln is a community that values its quality of life and libraries are an important contributor. Unfortunately, our revenues aren't keeping pace with the increased costs of services, resulting in over 110 job cuts in City government over the last two years. The upcoming 2009–2010 budget is showing signs of being even more challenging. Many important City services may not be funded if we can't find the community consensus necessary to solve our revenue problems.

I understand there also is concern about Irvingdale Pool. The operation of this neighborhood pool is funded for the 2009 season.

I hope you will take a new survey about the budget on the City Web site at lincoln.ne.gov. Your input is very valuable to us. I also urge you to educate your co-workers, neighbors, and friends about the City revenue situation and the importance of libraries and pools to the community. I remain hopeful that if we work together, we can find solutions to help us preserve the City services that are important to Lincoln's quality of life.

(Ruth Thone is a writer, teacher and mother of 3 daughters. She was the First Lady of Nebraska from 1979 to 1983 and lived in Washington DC from 1971 to 1979 when her husband Charles Thone was Congressman from Nebraska First District).

Little did we know, during that crunch time of finding a house in January 1983, we'd come to love this house on the corner of Woodsdale and 31st. Charley (then Governor) was at the Sun Bowl in El Paso when we made the offer and concluded by telephone.

We were moving from that large lovely house owned by the State of Nebraska at 14th & H, not only to another house but to a new life of heavenly quiet and days and nights of our choosing. I was worried I'd never learn to navigate the curving streets in this part of town because downtown the streets are numbered and lettered.

Our middle daughter Marie, visiting from Boston, said she knew we were to buy this house when she saw the wallpaper in the dining room, which matched hand-made pottery dishes she and her sisters were giving us for Christmas. Amy, in her first year of college at UNL and her last in Lincoln, came occasionally to do her laundry and told us she liked the new sofa but too bad it didn't

match a single other piece of front room furniture. The cats bounced from the stairs onto the rug in the front hall, loving sliding around where they might be let out and/or could get pets from visitors. We went through the drill of walking them around the house several times, in order to get them to recognize their new house.

After we moved into our house in the Country Club neighborhood, it seemed like everyone grew up around there. Our house was the "old Lau house," although two other families had lived here since Margaret Lau. I remember "the old Chesen house" where Irv Chesen grew up at 2900 Woodsdale, which is now home to Margaret and Fred Rickers. Jobie and Dick Russell, still living in "the old Woodruff house" at the northwest corner of 29th and Woodsdale, came right over to welcome us with baked sweets and Penny Kirk Bradley, then living in the big modern house on the southeast corner of our



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Woodsdale-facing block brought over coffee and cups.

Years later we are fiercely protective of our perfect house in the perfect neighborhood, Charley insisting that he is never leaving. We've been so comfortable and happy here --our cupboards and drawers full of 26 years of stuff that we lugged in here. Our corrections and additions to these minutes of our lives include occasional housepainting, constant gardening, repairs, a lovely railing along the sidewalk, an extra bathroom, new carpet and kitchen counters. In recent years those sure signs of old age—hand holds and railings.

On my 70th birthday, seven years ago, I had a tea for my favorite women friends. It took me two weeks to move the piles of stuff so there was room to set out tea cups and chairs. Thus our house is not decorator-ready but certainly perfect family-friendly home, even when the girls come home.

When I used to walk at night, I recognized people mostly by their dogs, not remembering names. 30th street has a 4th of July party and one year Charley was Uncle Sam in the parade, leading the little kids up and down the street. Each 4th of July we go to Omaha during the day and return late at night, ooh-ing and aah-ing over the fireworks lighting up the neighborhood night sky. Such a sense of welcome gladdens our hearts every time we come back to our once-new and now-old house.

POLICE REPORT: Simple Crime Prevention: Lock Garage Doors Filed by: Capt Kim Koluch, LPD

Spring has sprung and we all know that with warmer weather comes an increase in certain property crimes like burglary and larceny. Yes, apparently even criminals like the comfort of a warm cozy fire

on a cold winter's night. The good news is, in both cases you have the power to drastically reduce or eliminate your chances of being the victim of a crime.

Larceny from a parked vehicle is the number one property crime in Lincoln, resulting in hundreds of thousands of dollars in lost property and damage each year, and we know from experience that certain vehicles make better targets. For example, a car parked on the street is more likely to be broken into than a car parked in the driveway. If valuables are left in plain sight criminals are not shy about breaking out a window, and if a car is left unlocked it is easily ransacked. Over the past few years we have also seen an increase in larcenies from parked cars where the perpetrators can predict how long the car will be left unattended. For example people parking at fitness centers or trailheads to walk or run usually tuck their wallet or purse under the front seat, and are predictably gone for an hour or two. Parking in a driveway is good and parking in your garage is better, keep valuables in the trunk or glove box and lock your car. In 2008, Southeast Team officers worked 236 residential burglaries resulting in reported losses of \$349,681.00 and damages of \$21,286.00. Of those 236, entry was made through an open or unlocked door 108 times and 74 of those were open garage doors. If we could just get people to close their garage doors we might have prevented nearly 31% of the burglaries reported.

The really good news for the Country Club neighborhood is that you have a very active neighborhood association that stays current and informed about crimes in the neighborhood. You can stay more informed about what is going on in your particular neighborhood by getting Crime Alerts. These alerts are available by going to the LPD web page <u>http://www.lincoln.ne.gov/city/police/</u> and clicking on "Crime Alerts" under "Online Services," and then simply follow the prompts.

- 1 large can crushed pineapple, undrained
- 2 small cans mandarin oranges, drained
- 1/2 C sugar
- 3 mashed bananas.
