CCNA HISTORY Our 100th Anniversary

(This year, the Country Club neighborhood is celebrating its 100th anniversary. In this issue of The Chronicle, we look back at the beginnings of the neighborhood. In the next issue, we will track our growth over the past one hundred years.)

Picture life in Lincoln in 1907: The state had just celebrated the inauguration of 36-year-old George L. Sheldon, the first native Nebraskan to be elected governor. The downtown was the hub of the city and home to the offices of the city's prominent businessmen. Miller & Paine was a thriving retail store and the Bijou Theater at 15th and O Streets offered "high-class vaudeville."

The local newspapers advertised oil heaters, oil lamps and talking machines (gramophones). 100-piece dinner sets could be purchased for \$9.00 and children's bearskin coats were on sale for just \$2.50. Social activities of small towns such as Havelock and University Place were reported in weekly columns. News stories contained dramatic, biased descriptions: "the suspect was not only a gay lothario among women, a burglar and horse thief, but a murderer six times over as well."

The city of Lincoln was experiencing great growth. When the original city planners had laid out the streets, they designated "South Street" at the farthest point south they could imagine the city growing. However, by 1907 the city was ready to move beyond that border.

In fact, an impressive home was already being built south of South Street (at what is now 2221 Sheridan) by a prominent businessman, Frank Spalding. His home, designed by Ferdinand Fiske, was on land owned by local entrepreneurs Mark, George and Frank Woods. The story of our neighborhood and its beginnings always starts with the Woods brothers and their vision for a modern, upscale addition to Lincoln.

In the early 1900s, the Woods brothers had purchased a beautiful tract of corn field which was bordered by 13th and 27th and South to Calvert streets. Mark Woods recalled later, "George and I felt the development of modern residential lots with shrubbery planned and set back and building cost restrictions would pay us for the effort as well as beautify Lincoln and be a credit to the city for years to come." They were especially drawn to a



geographic ridge which ran through the area and which would provide a "crowning point" to the current residential district and which was "destined to contain Lincoln's most beautiful homes." Local legend tells of Mark Woods riding that ridge and marking the future roadway with American flags. The street he delineated would become Sheridan Boulevard.



The Woods Brothers hired Jens Jensen of Chicago, world famous city planner, to lay out the streets and to create landscaping plans. They then began the tedious work of developing the area and quickly earned a reputation for foresight and ingenuity when dealing with the numerous problems which arose. A 1988 Journal Star article outlined some of the early problems and their creative solutions: When the prairie sod proved difficult to turn, the Woods companies

imported Percheron horses from France to provide the pulling power. When the Woods brothers had trouble securing phone service, they founded Lincoln Automatic Telephone which later became Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph Co. When transportation problems developed, they founded White Line Traction Co. which ran a streetcar down Sheridan Blvd. to College View. They even went into the nursery business to provide trees for the streets they were laying out.

In June 1909, the Woods brothers undertook a massive advertising campaign for their new addition. Their vision was bigger than simple ownership of land. They were promoting a gracious way of living and they began by using the existing Spalding construction as a selling point: "...one of our wealthiest men, Mr. F. M. Spalding, is erecting there a \$35,000 Colorado sandstone mansion."

The Woods ads also touted the extensive work which had been done to make the new area more desirable: "(The Woods Brothers) have moved over 50,000 yards of earth. They have put in over two and a half miles of five-foot cement walks, have planted many hundreds of beautiful elm trees, have laid a complete system of city water all through the addition. They have sodded and parked the lawn and park spaces. In fact, they have spent \$45,000 in modernizing, beautifying and making Sheridan Place the most attractive home-building spot in the city of Lincoln." And the ads touted the aesthetics of the area: "In crossing from the heart of the city to Sheridan Place, you cross no railroad tracks, go through no low lands with undesirable houses. It is impossible for one to describe this addition. It must be seen to appreciate its wonderful location, its many advantages, its beautiful surroundings and the magnificent views."

One hundred years later, it is obvious that the vision of the Woods family was realized and that their promotional efforts paid off. Sheridan Place did indeed become what they had hoped: A crowning point of the city which contains some of Lincoln's most beautiful homes.


In this book, Professor Morris Schwartz talks about what really gives a person satisfaction and meaning in life...

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

Those Pesky Illegal Signs...

Speaking of garage sales, this is the time of year that people violate the City sign ordinance. No sign - garage sale, real estate, political, etc. - shall ever be placed on public property - street lights or poles, traffic poles, trees or in the city right-of-way which is between the sidewalk and the curb OR if there is no sidewalk, where the sidewalk would normally be.

If you want to put up a sign on private property, you must get permission from the property owner. Remember, if you place a sign and puncture a sprinkler system (which has happened several times) you are responsible.

Absolutely NO SIGNS on any of the boulevards or intersection corners. Not only is it unsightly, these illegal signs have been known to be the cause of fender benders and other traffic accidents. Don't be the guilty one.

If you do put up a sign with the permission of the private property owner, it should be put up the day of the sale and taken down immediately after the sale.

If you have work done on your house, please have the contractor follow the sign ordinance and also have the contractor take down the sign after the work has been completed. There are still several signs up from work that was done last fall. After a while the ill will exceeds any advertising benefits.



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
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Pocras Park (aka The Triangle Park)

SCHOOL NEWS

The City of Lincoln is sponsoring a “Count Down” traffic signal program that will specifically tell all pedestrians how much time they have left to cross the street. The \$2,400.00 cost to add these countdown signals has been paid for by CCNA, Irving and Sheridan Schools. Look for the installation to be sometime this spring.

Irving Middle School, one of Lincoln’s oldest public schools, will celebrate its 80th Anniversary with an Open House on Sunday, April 22nd from 2:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M. Musical entertainment will be provided by students along with “points of interest” focusing on the history of Irving Middle School. Refreshments will be served.

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
